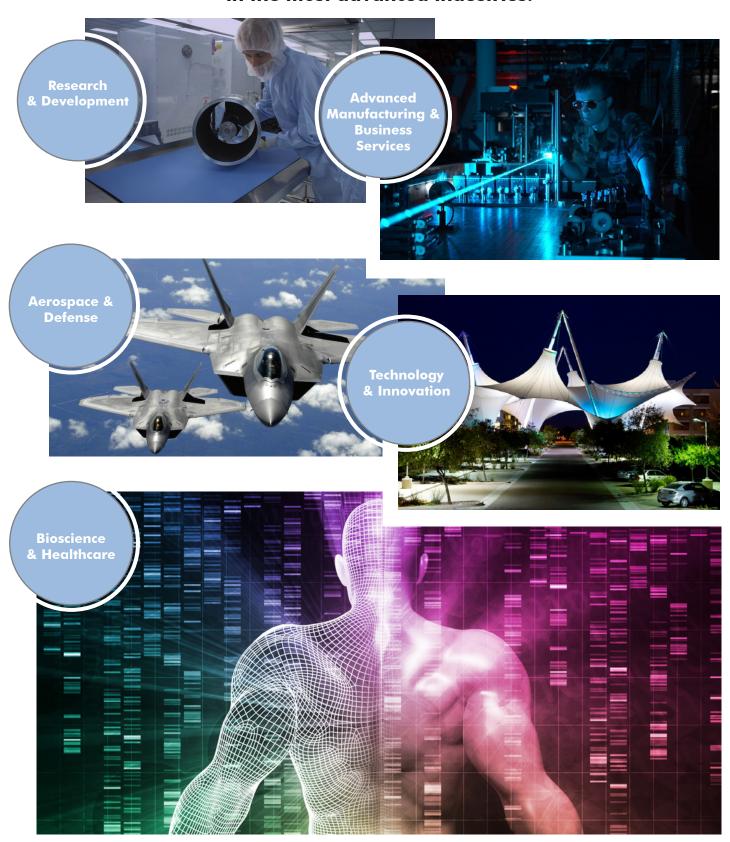

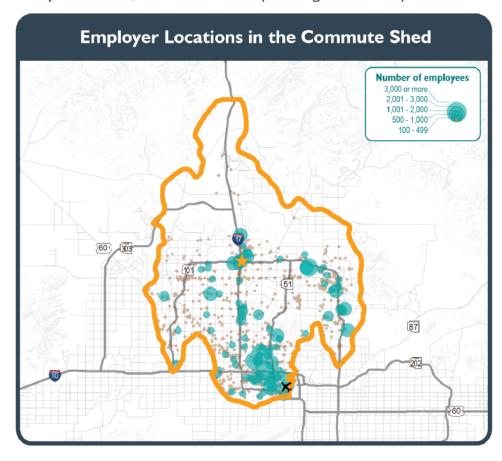

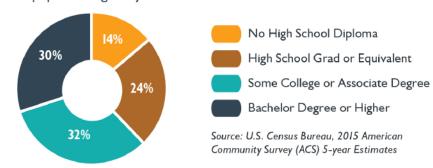
Median Home Sales Price

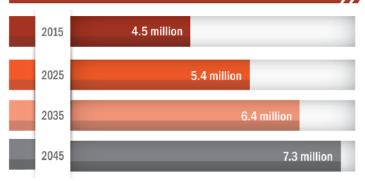
